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WHITETAIL 101: THE BASICS

You've successfully completed a hunter education course and decided to pursue whitetail deer, but don't know what to do next. Let us help! Attend this no-cost, informational workshop.

WHEN: Saturday, October 5, 2013, 8:30AM – 12:30PM

WHERE: Inland Fisheries Region 2, 6200 Hatchery Rd, Fort Worth

TIME: 8:30AM - 12:30PM.

(Don't be late! The gates will be locked promptly at 8:30AM.)

We'll talk about habitat as we walk around the facility looking for signs (such as tracks and droppings) of deer in the area. In addition, we'll discuss legal equipment used in hunting whitetail in Texas.

Finally, we'll build the internal organs of a deer and learn the importance of shot placement.

From the North: Take I-820W. Take exit 10A toward TX-199/Jacksboro Hwy/Lake Worth Blvd. Turn right onto Roberts Cut Off Rd. Turn right onto Meandering Rd. Continue onto Sand Springs Rd. Turn left onto Garden Rd. Take the first left onto Hatchery Rd. Inland Fisheries will be on the right.

From the South: Take I-35W N. Take exit 51A to merge onto I-30W toward Abilene. Take exit 13B for Henderson St. Turn right onto TX-199W/Henderson St. Continue to follow TX-199W. Turn right onto River Oaks Blvd. Turn right onto Roberts Cut Off Rd. Turn left onto Meandering Rd. Continue onto Sand Springs Rd. Turn left onto Garden Rd. Take the first left onto Hatchery Rd. Inland Fisheries will be on the right.

From the East: Take I-30W toward Abilene. Take exit 13B for Henderson St. Turn right onto TX-199W/Henderson St. Continue to follow TX-199W. Turn right onto River Oaks Blvd. Turn right onto Roberts Cut Off Rd. Turn left onto Meandering Rd. Continue onto Sand Springs Rd. Turn left onto Garden Rd. Take the first left onto Hatchery Rd. Inland Fisheries will be on the right.

From the West: Take I-30E. Take exit 7B toward TX-183/TX-341/NAS Forth Worth JRB/Green Oaks Rd. Merge onto West Fwy. Merge onto TX-183N/Alta Mere Dr via the ramp to NAS Fort Worth JRB. Continue to follow TX-183N. Turn left onto Yale St.. Turn left onto Meandering Rd. Continue onto Sand Springs Rd. Turn left onto Garden Rd.Take the first left onto Hatchery Rd. Inland Fisheries will be on the right.



Responsive Management News

Approval of Hunting Highest Since 1995


79% of Americans Approve of Hunting

A recently released nationwide scientific survey by Responsive Management shows that 79% of Americans 18 years old and older approve of hunting, up five percentage points from 74% in 2011. This marks the highest level of support for hunting since 1995, according to data compiled by Responsive Management.

Responsive Management has been tracking trends in public approval of hunting since 1995, which has remained generally consistent during this time: 73% in 1995, 75% in 2003, 78% in 2006, 74% in 2011, and now at 79% (see graph below). At 79%, approval is the highest since Responsive Management has tracked it. The reasons for this increase are still unclear, but it may be related to the recent increase in hunting and shooting participation that has occurred.

Since 2006, hunting participation has increased by 9%, according to the *National Survey of Fishing, Hunting, and Wildlife-Associated Recreation* (U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, 2011). Meanwhile, shooting participation has increased by 18% since 2009 (Responsive Management, 2013). Other studies on public opinion on hunting conducted by Responsive Management show that the strongest correlation with approval of hunting is knowing a hunter--over and above demographic variables or any other factor. With the increased number of hunters in the field and sport shooters at the range, it is possible that this increase is being reflected in support for hunting as well.

Overall, the most recent study found that more than half of Americans (52%) strongly approve of hunting (79% strongly or moderately approve). At the other end of the spectrum, 12% disapprove (strongly or moderately) of hunting. Another 9% gave a neutral answer.

Methodology

Conducted in February 2013, the study surveyed 1,306 Americans 18 years old and older using random digit dialing and supplemental cell phone sampling. The sampling error is +/- 3.00 percentage points. The survey was the fifth in a series of surveys by Responsive Management to track trends in public approval of hunting.
